"God Works Mysteriously"

My grandfather Sang Fen grew up as an orphan. American missionaries took him in and he became the first Christian from his hometown. After finishing high school and with some training from the missionaries he went out and preached the gospel throughout, Chin state, Burma. Back then Burma was in the "dark" so to speak, and it still is for many.

One of the many villages my grandfather went to preach was Tlau Hmun.

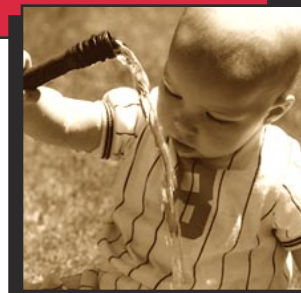
There lived Thang Tin Lian, a chief who was responsible for many villages and territories, and had 3 wives at the same time. My grandfather wanted to preach in Tlau Hmun but elders from the village were not too thrilled to hear the gospel. They came up with a tall hurdle for my grandfather to go through



hoping he would move on. He did have to wrestle the strongest man in the Village before he could open his bible. My grandfather was not a "fit" man. To the Elders' surprise he accepted. To my grandfathers surprise he was able to preach.

From village to village he would have to jump through different hoops. Some villages would not welcome him at all. Sometimes he would have to spend the night in the

There were many men like my grandfather spreading Christianity. Thanks to American missionaries we will be celebrating 100 Years Of Christianity in Chin State next year.

During the early 1960s, the Burmese government expelled all foreigners including all missionaries. My father became a preacher and started to work in one of the towns in the Chin State. After a year or two my father met a woman and got married. They have been happily married for 40 years. My mother is the daughter of Chief Thang Tin Lian.

Newcastle Newcastle upon Tyne, England

Full-bodied and hearty, this classic tawny-brown ale has a sweet, nutty mouthfeel that readily bathes the palate with flavor. The distinct nutty aroma creates an inviting context for the mild fruity-flowery quality at mid-glass. A balancing bitterness lingers in the aftertaste, nicely enhanced by the expanding doughy, grainy mouthfeel. Propelled by a light effervescence, Newcastle's mild hop character gets more play at the end. An unusual taste treat, this ale goes well with, of all things, licorice. Go ahead-try it!

Beer Recipe

Wheat Beer Potato Soup

- 2 lbs russet potatoes, peeled and diced large
- 1/2 lb onions, diced
- 1/2 carrots, diced
- 2 quarts chicken stock
- 2 cups heavy cream
- 2 cups hefeweiss
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Garnish: croutons, shredded cheddar cheese

*Boil potatoes, onions, and carrots in chicken stock until soft. Blend well in a blender.

*Reheat mixture, and add cream. Add beer and salt and pepper to taste. It is not necessary to strain.

*Serve with croutons and shredded cheddar cheese.

Beer, the remedy for all sorts of ailments

In Babylon and Egypt, long considered as the birthplace of beer, the drink was offered to the gods and was mainly used by kings and at important festivals. The Egyptians also attributed a therapeutic effect to beer, and women of the upper classes used it for cosmetic purposes, ie. to freshen their skin and reduce the risk of certain skin conditions.

In ancient Greece Hippocrates used beer as a remedy to facilitate diuresis and the drink was also considered to act against fever. Alcohol was also used at this time to heal wounds. Aretus of Capadocia recommended it for diabetes and migraine.

In the Middle Ages beer was used as a stimulant to improve mood. Appetite generating and calming properties were attributed to the hop, a component of beer. Up until a hundred years ago, hop-filled cushions were recommended for sleeping disorders.

In the beginning of this century, the harmful consequences of alcohol abuse came to light, and medicine adopted a sceptical attitude towards alcoholic drinks, including beer. The emergence of powerful medicines further pushed out the use of alcohol as a remedy. It is only in the last few years that there has been renewed interest for the beneficial effect of alcohol on health.
